INNOVATIVE APPROACH TO SAFETY EDUCATION USES LIVE THEATRE AND SUPER HEROES TO TEACH YOUNG AUDIENCES

Edmonton, Alberta – Who says safety education can't be fun? This month, ATCO Energy Theatre and its "Super Power" show is visiting schools in 32 communities across central and southern Alberta to the delight of students who are laughing, giggling and shrieking all the while learning to be safe around natural gas and electricity.

Offered free-of-charge to elementary schools in communities served by ATCO Gas and ATCO Electric, ATCO Energy Theatre is a unique approach that uses "edu-tainment" to teach young children important lessons about electricity and natural gas, their hazards and how to avoid potentially fatal situations.

"Safety of the public, our customers and our employees is a core value at ATCO and ATCO Energy Theatre is a tangible part of that commitment," says Brian Hahn, President, ATCO Gas. "The program reinforces information presented in safety education programs already offered to schools by both ATCO Gas and ATCO Electric, as well as science information related to the Alberta school curriculum (Grades 4-6)."

"We believe live theatre is a particularly effective educational tool," says Sett Policicchio, President, ATCO Electric. "The script and performances by our actors allow our young audiences to see themselves in the context of the play which is extremely important for learning. We're using the power of theatre to tell a story that is relevant to their world and provides important information they can bring home and start applying immediately."

This is the second year of ATCO Energy Theatre's "Super Power" production. Since its introduction in 2007, over 30,000 students enjoyed watching *The Kid* working alongside *Power Woman* to defeat the evil villains *Rocket Socket*, *P-Yeww* and *Carmen Monoxide*. Teachers, students and principals from all over Alberta were impressed and engaged by this power-packed production. The tour has visited several smaller schools in more remote areas of the province, giving students their first exposure to the performing arts and live educational theatre that uses song and dance to deliver a very serious safety message.
